Prof Christopher Afoke Isike

Christopher Isike, PhD, is a Professor of African Politics and International Relations in the Department of Political Sciences, which he heads at the University of Pretoria, and Director of the African Centre for the Study of the United States, University of Pretoria (ACSUS-UP), South Africa. He is also the current President of the African Association of Political Science (AAPS), and a member of the Board of Directors of Global Development Network (GDN).

Professor Isike conducts research from an Africanist lens and teaches international relations theory, strategic and security studies, and security theory at the University of Pretoria. His research interests include African soft power politics, women, peace and conflict studies, women and political representation in Africa, rethinking state formation in Africa, politics in a digital era and African immigration to South Africa.

A C2-rated researcher by the NRF, Prof Isike has over 80 publications in top national and international peer-reviewed journals, including chapters in books published by reputable publishing houses globally. His latest edited books include Big Brother Naija and Popular Culture in Nigeria: A Critique of the Country's Cultural and Economic Diplomacy Palgrave Macmillan (2023, with O. Ogunnubi and O. Ukwueze) and Conflict and Conviviality: The Ambivalence of African Migrant/Host Relations in South Africa, Palgrave Macmillan (2022, with E. Isike).

He is Editor-in-Chief of Africa's foremost political science journal, *Politikon: South African Journal of Political Studies* (2020 to 2024). He has been Editor of *Ubuntu: Journal of Conflict and Social Transformation* since 2017.

He also serves on the editorial board of several reputable international journals, such as *International Political Science Abstracts*, *Canadian Journal of African Studies*, *African Journal of Political Science* and *Strategic Review for Southern Africa*. Professor Isike is also a member of the editorial board of the *OIDA International Journal of Sustainable Development*.

Prof Isike consults for the UNFPA, UNICEF, UN Women, and the KwaZulu-Natal provincial government on gender equality and women's empowerment issues in South Africa. He is a Social Cohesion Advocate of South Africa appointed by the Minister of Sports, Arts and Culture (2020 – 2024).

Good governance and Governance Security as imperatives for sustainable development in Africa

Abstract

This paper shall argue for governance security as the eighth element of the human security paradigm using the case studies of the insurgency and military coups in West and Central Africa. This is meant to spark a debate for contributing toward a non-Western understanding of security and insecurity in Africa, as it has been marginalized in its contributions to security literature. Apart from teasing out an understanding of security based on African realities, the argument shall also be based on the logic of good governance as foundational to realizing the existing seven elements of human security and ensuring sustainable development in the continent. Therefore, The presentation shall examine Africa's governance challenges and their impact on human security and sustainable development. The idea is to test the proposition that governance challenges in Africa lead to instability with negative consequences for sustainable development in the continent.

2:30 pm 4:30 pm	<p>Panel discussion on the Perspectives on Durable Solutions to the Challenges of Rohingya's Plight</p> <p>In this, the second OIDA special session on the plight of Rohingyas, the first one being in 2019, it is important to reflect on how little has changed since the first session in 2019 but also on how much has changed on this, the sixth anniversary of Rohingya people who fled Myanmar for their lives in 2017. Marooned in Bangladesh refugee camps with little prospect of a safe repatriation mechanism, despite its generosity in hosting the refugees, Bangladesh is the subject of increasing criticism and pressure in many respects. These tensions relate to the lack of education and skills a generation of children in the camp, both those who travelled to the camp and those born into the camp, are being exposed to, the experience of Bangladeshis living in close proximity to the camps, the ecological impacts of the camps, particularly at night, and the breeding ground for illicit trade and conduct that makes maintenance of law and order, particularly at night, difficult to enforce. Concurrently, the world's attention is pulled elsewhere to the Russia-Ukraine war and the Gaza-Israel situation, these conflicts occurring in a post-pandemic world that has depleted the resources of all countries and added to compassion fatigue. In this situation, Rohingyas in the camps have been reduced to surviving on \$8US per month each.</p> <p>What is needed is a durable solution for Rohingyas in Bangladesh camps and this special session is designed to draw together a variety of stakeholders and experts to discuss the best way forward for both Rohingya people and Bangladesh's leadership. Mr. Kamrul Hasan Tarafder

Mr Tarafder has been the President/CEO and co-founder of ASA Philippines Foundation since July 2004. ASA Philippines Foundation is a local NGO with no connection with other organizations outside the Philippines. He is the vice chairman and co-founder of Microfinance Information Data Sharing Inc. (MiDAS), a credit bureau for the microfinance industry which was founded in 2011. MiDAS has over 9 million individual data as of December 2019 and is recognizing as the highest database credit bureau in the country. He is also the Treasurer of the Microfinance Council of the Philippines (MCPI), a national network of 65 microfinance institutes, including Rural Bank, NGOs and Cooperatives of the Philippines. Mr. Tarafder is also the Chairman of AMINA Foundation, a microfinance organization operating in Bangladesh. Mr. Tarafder is recognized as one of the 2020 Triple-A Awardees (Asian Institute Management (AIM) Alumni Achievement Awardee), a prestigious recognition given by AIM to its Alumni last February 29, 2020, for his dedication to

leadership and managerial skills were used as a solid foundation to fulfil his passion for helping the less privileged and empowering them to create future for themselves.



Dr. Mohshin Habib, Ph.D.

Dr Mohshin Habib is an Adjunct Professor at Laurentian University, Canada, and Visiting Professor at the University of Santo Tomas, Philippines. He has extensive experience in sustainable development, microfinance, socio-economic development, the economics of refugee resettlement and in forced migration and displacement contexts. His academic career spans 20 years across Monash University, Deakin University and Swinburne University of Technology in Australia. He has also held various senior academic roles including those of Director and Program Coordinator of the International Business Program and Discipline Leader, Management, at Swinburne Business School.

In 2018, Dr Habib led an international consortium and conducted the largest sample of refugee study involving primary data. He is the lead author of "*Forced Migration of Rohingya: The Untold Experience*".

Results reported in this book assisted the United Nations Human Rights Council's Independent International Fact-Finding Mission on Myanmar in formulating conclusions and recommendations, including those relating to the prosecution of senior Myanmar military leaders in international criminal tribunals and conditions for the repatriation of refugees. He have been invited as an expert panellist on Human Rights violations against Rohingya and other minorities in Myanmar at the 53rd Regular Session of the United Nations Human Rights Council (UNHRC) in Geneva. Currently, he serves as a member of the editorial board for the OIDA Journal of Sustainable Development, Indonesian Treasury Review and Skillman.eu. He works as Policy and Strategy Adviser at ASA Philippines Foundation, the largest Microfinance Institution in Southeast Asia and the Pacific. Mr. Habib holds a PhD in International Development from Deakin University, Australia, MBA from the University of Santo Tomas and a bachelor's degree in ICT.



Mac Mackie

Mac Mackie is currently acting as a legal consultant for the international NGO Fortify Rights, an organization that collects, documents, and analyzes evidence of human rights violations in Southeast Asia. He has accepted a position as Attorney-Adviser with the Office of the Legal Adviser, U.S. Department of State, pending approval of his security clearance. Before that, Mac spent seven years in the Washington, D.C. office of Covington & Burling LLP, where his practice focused primarily on public international law and the representation of sovereign governments, in addition to other international and transnational legal matters. He holds an LL.M. With Highest Honors in International and Comparative Law from The George Washington University Law School, J.D. magna cum laude from the Washington and Lee University School of Law, and a Bachelor of Arts from the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill.

H.E. Muhammad Abdul Muhith
Ambassador and Permanent
Representative of Bangladesh to the
United Nations

Ambassador Muhammad Abdul Muhith presented his credentials to the United Nations Secretary-General as the Permanent Representative of Bangladesh to the United Nations in New York on 02 August 2022.

Ambassador Muhith joined Bangladesh Foreign Service in 1993. Prior to his current post, he was the Ambassador of Bangladesh to Austria with concurrent accreditation to Hungary, Slovenia, Slovakia and Permanent Representative of Bangladesh to the UN Offices and International Organizations in Vienna (2020-2022). He also served as the Ambassador of Bangladesh to Denmark with concurrent accreditation to Estonia and Iceland from 2015 to 2020. In his diplomatic career spanning around three decades, he served in different capacities at various Bangladesh Missions abroad including in the Embassy of Bangladesh in Washington DC (Minister and Deputy Chief), Permanent Mission of Bangladesh to the United Nations in New York (Counsellor/Minister), Embassy of Bangladesh in Doha (Counsellor), Embassy of Bangladesh in Rome (Second /First Secretary) and Embassy of Bangladesh in Kuwait (Third/Second Secretary). In the Headquarters, among other responsibilities, he served as the Director-General of Americas Wing, Europe Wing and as the Director of the office of the Foreign Secretary. Ambassador Muhith holds Bachelor and Master's degree in Social Science from the University of Dhaka, Bangladesh.



H.E. Aung Kyaw Moe

Aung Kyaw Moe is the Deputy Union Minister for the Ministry of Human Rights. He is the first Rohingya since 1962 to take a ministerial position. Prior to that, he was an advisor to the National Unity Government's Ministry of Human Rights as the first Rohingya member to be appointed as part of the Democratically elected government of Myanmar. Aung Kyaw Moe works tirelessly to integrate Rohingya as an integral part of Myanmar's democratization process. He played an important and leading role in developing NUG's Rohingya policy in 2021. His work within NUG has changed the perception of Rohingya of many hardcore Myanmar political leaders and ethnic leaders fighting for democracy, which resulted in an attitude change toward Rohingya by millions of Myanmar who used to anti-Rohingya. Aung Kyaw Moe was awarded the Tomorrow's Peacebuilders' Youth-led Peacebuilding Award in 2017 for innovative peacebuilding efforts, the Schumann Award in 2019 for his contribution to peace

and human rights, and most recently, the Global Pluralism Award, which recognizes extraordinary achievements of those tackling the challenge of living peacefully and productively with diversity. Most recently, he was awarded the French Human Rights Award by the government of France. Aung Kyaw Moe has worked with diverse international NGOs for over 13 years, contributing to peacebuilding efforts around the world during his time in Thailand, Afghanistan, and Liberia. He has a Master Degree in Humanitarian assistance from Deakin University and completed several fellowships.



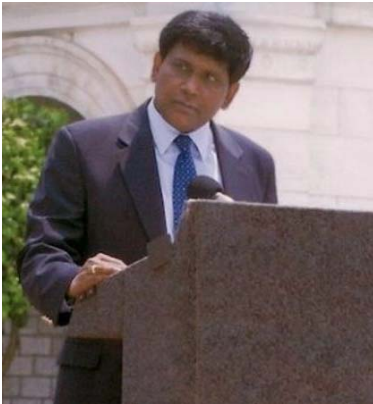
Tom Andrews

A former member of the US Congress from Maine, Tom Andrews is a Robina Senior Human Rights Fellow at Yale University Law School, an Associate of Harvard University's Asia Center and has a Washington DC based consulting practice, Andrews Strategic Services. He has worked with the National Democratic Institute for International Affairs and parliamentarians, NGOs and political parties in several countries including Cambodia, Indonesia, Algeria, Croatia, Serbia, Ukraine and Yemen.

Andrews served as General Secretary of "The Nobel Peace Laureate Campaign for Aung San Suu Kyi and the People of Burma" in 2001 and was a consultant for the National Coalition Government of the Union of Burma and the Euro-Burma Network. He has run advocacy NGOs including Win Without War and United to End Genocide, led an education institute at the University of Maine and served in the Maine House of Representatives and the Maine Senate. He lives with his wife and son in Fairfax, Virginia outside of Washington DC.

The mandate of the Special Rapporteur on the situation of human rights in Myanmar was first established in 1992 under the Commission on Human Rights Resolution 58 and extended annually. Human Rights Resolution 25/26 adopted 15 April 2014 broadened the mandate to report on the progress in the electoral process and reform in the run-up to the 2015 election. Human Rights Resolution 31/24 adopted 24 March 2016 broadened the mandate to include identifying benchmarks for progress and priority areas for technical assistance and capacity-building.

T. Kumar

Kumar was Amnesty International USA's Advocacy Director, for more than 20 years. Kumar has monitored several elections around the world with Former US President Carter and with Organization for Security and Cooperation in Europe (OSCE). He also served as a Judge of Elections in Philadelphia and served as the UN Representative for Peace Brigades International. He has testified numerous times before US Congress and frequently lectured at Foreign Service Institute where US Diplomats are trained. Kumar has analyzed and advocated for strong mechanisms to address human rights and humanitarian situations across the globe. A former political prisoner for over five years in his native Sri Lanka, he started his legal studies in prison and eventually became an Attorney-at-Law and devoted his entire practice to promote and protect human rights.



Professor Christine Jubb

Professor Christine Jubb (CPA Auditing, CA), PhD (Melbourne), Grad Dip Sc. in App. Statistics (Swinburne), MBA (Deakin), Grad Dip Ed (Monash), BBus (Acc.) (RMIT) currently holds a Chair in Accounting and Finance and is a University Senate Committee member at Swinburne University of Technology and a member of the Academic Standards Quality Committee. She was previously Research Fellow and Director of the Australian National Centre for Audit and Assurance Research at the Australian National University. She was appointed, by the Australian Financial Reporting Council, to the Auditing and Assurance Standards Board in 2005 and reappointed for a second three-year term to the Board which ended in December 2010. Professor Jubb has worked in a number of Australian Universities including Melbourne University, Monash University and Deakin University. Her research interests lie in the areas – the market for external audit services, microfinance, entrepreneurship and enterprise development, impact assessments, research methodology etc. She currently is supervising 13 PhD candidates working in these areas and many more have graduated with PhD, Master by Research or Honours degrees.

Her main teaching area at Swinburne is Accounting Theory. She has been the recipient of prestigious Australian Research Council Discovery Grants and Australian Research Council Linkage Grants and many more national and international research grants. Currently she is working on two research projects in Cambodia and the Philippines on disaster mitigation and microfinance, intergenerational poverty and poverty alleviation measurement tools.



Tun Khin

Tun Khin is a Rohingya. He was born and brought up in Arakan State, Burma. His grandfather was a Parliamentary Secretary during democratic Period of Burma. His mother's grandfather was the first Judge in Northern Arakan State, Myanmar. Although well-established and respected, alongside a million other ethnic Rohingya, Tun Khin was not recognized as a citizen of Burma. He is co-founder and President of Burmese Rohingya Organization UK which has been a leading voice for Rohingya people around the world.

Tun Khin has briefed officials on the Genocide committed against Rohingya populations at the British Parliament, Swedish Parliament, Morocco Parliament, Canada Parliament, European Union Parliament, US Senate, US Congress State Department, the UN Indigenous Forum in NY and the UN Human Rights Council in Geneva.

Tun Khin has been a featured speaker on Rohingya's rights for the BBC, Sky News, CNN, Al Jazeera and many other media outlets. Tun Khin filed Universal Jurisdiction case in Argentina against Myanmar military and civilian government for genocide war crimes, crimes against humanity.

He received a leadership award from Refugees International Washington DC in April 2015 for his relentless effort working on Rohingya crisis.

Wai Wai Nu

Wai Wai Nu is a former political prisoner and the Founder and Executive Director of the Women's Peace Network (WPN) in Myanmar. Through WPN, Wai Wai works to build gender equality, peace and mutual understanding between Myanmar's ethnic communities and to empower and advocate for the rights of marginalized women throughout Myanmar, including by documenting cases of sexual and gender-based violence. Through her work on My Friend Campaign, she has been recognised as a Champion of Prevention by the UN Office of the Prevention of Genocide and Responsibility to Protect. Wai Wai is a recipient of, among others, Hillary Rodham Clinton Award for Women's Peace Security (2018); and City of Athens Democracy Award (2021). She was also named as a Young Global Leader by World Economic Forum; among "100 Top Women", BBC (2014); Next Generation Leader, Time Magazine (2017); Women of the Year, Financial Times (2018). Wai Wai received her law degree LL.B. from the University of Yangon in Myanmar and her LL.M. from the University of Berkeley, School of Law.

Ms. Chris Lewa

Ms. Chris Lewa is the Director and founder of the Arakan Project (AP), a non-governmental organization engaged in research and advocacy on the human rights situation of the Rohingya minority in Myanmar, and on their conditions as refugees in Bangladesh and the Asian region. AP also monitors Rohingya maritime movements in the Andaman Sea since 2006.

She is also Deputy Chair of the Rohingya Working Group of the Asia-Pacific Refugee Rights Network (APRRN), a regional network of civil society organizations promoting refugee rights.

Ms. Lewa has also been providing consultancy services to international agencies and donor governments.
